

A unique month, February. It is the shortest month. As we all know, the 14th is celebrated as Valentine's Day -- a day devoted to supposedly expressing feelings in one form or another for the one you love. St. Valentine's Day originated, according to Wikipedia, as a Western Christian feast day honoring one or two early saints named Valentinus. Valentine's Day is recognized as a significant cultural, religious, and commercial celebration of romance and romantic love in many regions around the world.

I recently read that the Romans viewed February as the month of purification. The word, februum, means purification. At that time, February was the last month of the year. The month was named in honor of Februus, the Roman god of purification. On the full moon day of this month, the Romans performed animal sacrifices to please their ancestors and spent a lot of their time praying. Very different activities for February from the Valentine's Day we are familiar with.

Not only do I think it's a nice break after the cold January to think in terms of love and its many forms but February also means at least that the light is returning. There are more minutes of daylight which I welcome. It's very often warmer than January which is better, too, since this recent bitter cold means I don't walk outside as much. Add to that the idea of purification, I think the Romans were onto something. Interesting that February used to be the last month of the year. It makes sense that the end of the year would be seen as a time of purification, a cleansing before heading into the next.

Very often, reflection on goals for the year happens in January. After one is done making plans and resolutions, along comes February, and one could do things like a fast, or get rid of clutter, breathe deeply on a regular basis, or meditate on where your life is going. I can see why Lent began in February when one would give up something like chocolate or caffeine, leading perhaps to some sort of purification. A transfer from the Romans to the Christians? Purification to make one think of the time leading up to the crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus?

Couldn't we have both within the month of February – Valentine's Day and Februam? The events might even dovetail. I could see self-care books and videos with purification as a focus during February. Or maybe a day set aside for meditation, fasting, listening to calming music. How about February 21? Those who had too much chocolate on the 14th could do a garlic cleanse! Or whatever cleanse might strike his/her fancy!

Just some thoughts on such a cold, winter day... Maybe it's the beautiful, blindingly white snow that makes me think of purification.
