The following is a copy of a letter from the Secular Coalition for America to Senator Mitch McConnell, R-KY:

Dear Senator McConnell,

As organizations that represent secular Americans, we noted your acknowledgement of us in the conclusion of your recent floor statement: "Americans of any faith and no faith at all can celebrate that we have a brilliant majority of originalist, textualist justices who will defend all of our constitutionally guaranteed freedoms and apply what the Bill of Rights actually says." We disagree with every word in that sentence.

We are not celebrating a "brilliant majority of originalist, textualist justices" who appear to believe that the Establishment Clause violates the Free Exercise Clause.

We are not celebrating that states are mandated to provide taxpayer dollars to discriminatory religious schools providing religious instruction in programs meant to provide a public education to rural students.

We are not celebrating a decision that blatantly misrepresented the facts of the case to allow a school employee who publicly led a majority of his football team in prayer to continue this coercive practice on the 50-yard line. Your statement that "[a] man was fired by government bureaucrats for praying" is so misleading that it does not deserve inclusion in a speech on the Senate floor.

Even your summary of the church-state separation issues leading up to this court term is exaggerated and alarmist. You described our efforts to ensure that faith-based organizations that receive federal funds to provide childcare will not discriminate against participants of different faiths and nonreligious people as "a sweeping 'Toddler Takeover' that was written to squeeze out faith-based childcare providers and secularize early childhood in this country." Ideally these issues would be considered too important to be mischaracterized in such disparaging terms.

The number of Americans you could fairly categorize as nonreligious is significant and growing. According to a June Gallup poll, nineteen percent of adults do not believe in God, a new high, and the numbers are highest among young people. Speaking for many of those 49 million Americans, we are not celebrating the ideologically biased decisions of a Supreme Court majority that, quoting Justice Sotomayor, "elevates one individual's interest in personal religious exercise...over society's interest in protecting the separation of church and state, eroding the protections for religious liberty for all."

While we thank you for finally acknowledging the existence of such a large and rapidly growing segment of the American people, such gratitude is tinged with extreme regret to see you do it in a way that so blatantly misrepresents the facts of the Supreme Court cases, the fundamental meaning of the Bill of Rights and the Establishment Clause, and the critical interests of the nonreligious in secular government and education.

#### January Book discussion: "Braiding Sweetgrass"

Our next book focus begins on January 15. The book is Braiding Sweetgrass (indigenous Wisdom, Scientific Knowledge, and the Teachings of Plants) by Robin Wall Kimmerer. Kimmerer is a botanist and American Distinguished Teaching Professor of Environmental and Forest Biology, Director, Center for Native Peoples and the Environment, at the State University of New York College of Environmental Science and Forestry. She is the author of numerous scientific articles, and the books Gathering Moss: A Natural and Cultural History of Mosses. As a botanist, Robin Wall Kimmerer has been trained to ask questions of nature with the tools of science. As a member of the Citizen Potawatomi Nation, she embraces the notion that plants and animals are our oldest teachers. In Braiding Sweetgrass, Kimmerer brings these lenses of knowledge together to show that the awakening of a wider ecological consciousness requires the acknowledgment and celebration of our reciprocal relationship with the rest of the living world. For only when we can hear the languages of other beings are we capable of understanding the generosity of the earth and learning to give our own gifts in return.
